Date and timing of the GERS publication had been originally scheduled for 9:30 on Friday 19 June. The Scottish Government's Chief Economist requested that we brought the publication forward a few hours to Thursday 18 June at 15:00 as he wanted to host a Press Launch. 15:00 on 18 June was the only time available to the Chief Economist without delaying the publication.

Reasons for breach

Publication at 15:00 breaches Protocol/Practice 2.4.

3 Reactions and Impact

While the GERS report is a National Statistics publication, it is a joint publication between statisticians and economists in the Scottish Government. Given the significant attention and comment that this publication receives, we felt it was essential for the Scottish Government's Chief Economic Adviser to head the Press launch. We believe this event helped to promote the integrity of the analysis and help to secure balanced coverage in the media.

We consulted members of the ScotStat network who had registered an interest in the publication (nearly 400 members) about the change in timing. We have received no comments or concerns then or since.
